Remembrance Day

This year 11 November marks the 101st anniversary of the Armistice which ended the First World War (1914–18). Each year on this day Australians observe one minute's silence at 11am, in memory of those who died or suffered in all wars and armed conflicts. Weetangera School observed the occasion in a number of ways in our classrooms, including specific learning opportunities for students and an observing a minute silence on Monday 11 November at 11am.
