

MUSIC

Welcome back to another exciting year at Weetangera. This term in music, all students will be exploring ways to compose music in different ways. They will work towards performing their own composition on a variety of instruments and sharing their musical ideas with their classmates.

The set learning goals this term include:

I CAN create compositions and perform music to communicate ideas to an audience.

I CAN learn and practice skills for singing and playing instruments.

I CAN use notation to represent and organise my musical ideas.

Morning Music Groups:

This year the students have the opportunity to participate in four morning groups each week. These groups will be beginning in Week 4 and there will be sign-up sheets outside of the music room for the students to write their names. There are no auditions, no cost and everyone is welcome. Families are encouraged to join in the learning with the students.

Monday: Ukulele Blue Group

This group will be for students who are continuing on from last year (in years 5 & 6).

Tuesday: Whole School Choir

The students in the junior and senior choir will be combined to form a whole school choir.

Wednesday: Ukulele Yellow Group

A beginner ukulele class available to those students in Years 3 & 4. The instruments are provided, however students are encouraged to bring their own if they like. There will be no storage of home instruments and are the responsibility of the owner.

Thursday: Bucket Drumming

This loud, engaging class is now available to students from Years 3-6. Buckets and sticks provided.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Welcome to Physical Education 2020!

I, Mr Lanham, am the physical education specialist again at Weetangera School for 2020. Throughout the year, it will be my role to provide students with opportunities to develop and improve gross

motor and fundamental movement skills. I will cater to a range of sporting abilities and experiences, and will aim to develop a variety of skills that will benefit students in sporting ventures, and in their schooling and personal lives.

The learning goals I have set for students in 2020 are:

- 'I know what it is to be a good sport'- playing fairly and safely
- 'I know what it is to be coachable'- accept feedback positively
- 'I know how I can improve my gross motor/fundamental movement skills'- moving my body

Throughout the first term, students will engage in the following:


Junior school (K-2)- students will practise gross motor skills as their body moves in relation to space, time, objects and people. We will discuss teamwork and following rules in physical activity. Students will be given opportunities to improve their balance, jumping, hopping/leaping and rolling throughout Term 1.

Senior School (Year 3-6)- students will practise and refine specialised and fundamental movement skills during physical activity. They will identify and apply cooperative skills that are essential to work effectively in teams, and set individual goals for motivation.

Year 6 students for 2020 have provided the physical education team with feedback (what they liked and what sports they would like to engage in for 2020). Students will learn rules, fair play and new movement skills in table tennis/ping pong, golf and basketball throughout Term 1.

I look forward to teaching physical education again in 2020. As many may know, sport and physical activity is my passion, and I will strive to leave students with a positive outlook on physical education for their school and personal lives!





SCIENCE

Hi, my name is Laura Keogh and I am excited about teaching your child for Science each week in 2020. I am new to Weetangera school; however, some of our 5/6 students will already know me from teaching them on Monday, Tuesday and part of Wednesday. I look forward to getting to know the students at Weetangera and working with them to continue to develop their interests and achieve their goals in Science.

When I am not teaching, I love to travel, draw, and keep fit by walking my dog and playing netball.

This term, all students will be engaged through a collaborative, inquiry-based approach in the area of Biological Sciences. I've provided a brief outline below of the unit the we will study this term.

Kindergarten: Staying Alive

Kindergarten students will learn about the basic needs for survival of animals, and how their senses help them to survive.

Year 2: Watch it Grow

This unit focuses on learning about the growth, development, reproduction and death of different organisms.

Year 3: Feathers, fur or leaves?

Through a collaborative, inquiry-based approach, students will learn how to distinguish living and nonliving things, as well as how to classify living things.

Year 5: Desert Survivors

This unit explores how the structural features and adaptations of desert plants and animals help them to survive in their natural environment.

Year 6: Marvellous Microorganisms

Students will investigate the role of micro-organisms in food and medicine. They will learn about yeast and the bread-making process, and research the development of penicillin.

FRENCH

My name is Shamim Sabetraftar and I am the French language specialist at Weetangera School for 2020. Throughout the year, I will assist the students on building their existing French knowledge, as well as building new vocabulary and language speaking skills. Students will focus on reading, writing, speaking and comprehension.



Throughout the first term, students will engage in the following:

- This term in French, Kindergarten students will learn to greet each other, introduce themselves and follow simple classroom instructions. They will also learn to answer simple questions about their feelings using role play and practise counting from 0 to 10 in French. They will use gestures, songs and games to develop their French speaking skills.
- This term in French, Year 1 and 2 students will practise asking and answering simple questions about each other (name, how they are feeling). They will also use simple vocabulary to identify objects in their classroom. By using gestures, books and role plays, they will develop their vocabulary and extend their speaking skills. They will develop their listening skills by following simple classroom instructions and by participating in games and simple numeracy activities.
- This term in French, Year 3 and 4 students will work on the topic of weather and how to describe it using French terminology. They will use gestures and role-plays to develop their speaking and listening skills, through introducing themselves, saying how they feel and questioning each other. This term we will also have a focus on learning French words to describe different items of clothing, as well as the names of different animals.
- This term in French, the Year 5 and 6 students will learn about different occupations using French vocabulary. They will learn to describe themselves with simple French terminology such as colours, lengths and body parts. Through gestures, role plays, and the use of digital resources, they will extend their speaking skills and learn to cooperate with each other. Games and listening activities will also be used to extend their comprehension skills.
